

Mayor Dorn announced that the public hearing would not be held regarding a resolution of public necessity to acquire real properties as part of the Airport Noise Mitigation Program, that the matter was pulled at the request of Council Member Kirkley.

Due to the overwhelming objection of the public regarding the removal of the public hearing from the agenda, the public hearing was held.

103.3 PUBLIC HEARING HELD - RESOLUTION OF PUBLIC NECESSITY TO ACQUIRE PROPERTY AS PART OF THE AIRPORT NOISE MITIGATION PROGRAM. The City Clerk announced that the next scheduled matter was a public hearing to consider the adoption of Resolution of Public Necessity to acquire property as part of the Airport Noise Mitigation Program, that notice of this hearing has been given in the time, form and manner as required by law, the affidavit was on file and no communication was received on the matter.

The City Administrative Officer presented staff report dated August 31, 1999 submitting background information.

Mayor Dorn ordered the staff report dated August 31, 1999 received and filed.

Mayor Dorn inquired if there were any persons present who wished to address the City Council on this matter.

Resident referred to a meeting where he was told that the City could amend the grant regarding easements and requested that the City do that.

Joyce Alexander, 4th Avenue, commented that she felt what was being done was not right.

Ms. Jackson commented that she did not like the way people were being treated.

Mildred McNair referred to an article in the newspaper regarding redirecting of planes over Inglewood and suggested a town hall meeting to get input to take to Washington.

Lydia Robinson inquired how the easements came about and requested that a study be done.

Velma Slaughter, District 1, expressed her opinion in opposition to LAX expansion.

Johnny Williams, District 1, expressed her opinion regarding avigation easements.

Dr. Marilyn Douroux, District 1, referred to comments made by the Councilman from District 1 and requested that he stop telling untruths.

Nzinga Owolo, District 3, commented that persons elected are not doing what they say they are doing and suggested Council amend the agreement regarding avigation easements.

James Patterson, District 1, commented that he agreed with the comments of earlier speakers noted that he was against avigation easements.

Michael Adams, 124 West Kelso, District 3, commented that the airport has already expanded and Council should take a strong stand.

Mabel Johnson, District 1, commented that the FAA grant regarding sound insulation should be amended.

Michelle Autry, District 4, spoke in opposition to signing avigation easements and persons suffering from the effects of toxicity.

Pastor Isaiah Robinson expressed concern regarding criteria used in determining who gets sound insulation and who doesn=t; rethinking designing for impact of airport noise.

Darryl Kaymac commented on the need for sound insulation, the quality of life, doing something positive for the City and the need for compassion and common sense.

Frederick Davis commented on the Chair addressing the issue rather than Council Member Kirkley and signing of avigation easements.

Ruth Houston, District 1, commented that the residents needed air conditioning with insulation.

Daniel Scott commented on the FAA criteria for sound insulation and noise levels.

Eric Teasley commented that new sound monitors be installed and a study done.

Del Anderson spoke concerning the City re-negotiating avigation easement rights.

Nancy Motan, District 1, referred to an article in the Wave Newspaper and the use of LAX money requiring avigation easements.

Council Member Horton commented that he was pleased persons came out to voice their opinions and encouraged everyone to attend a meeting scheduled by Council around October 10, 1999. In addition, he gave background on the history of home insulation in the City and commented on the noise decibel reduction which has allowed more people to get homes insulated. He referred to Title 21 and noted that State Legislators would need to amend this. Additionally, he noted that Council has encouraged the City Attorney to fight incremental expansion and commented that Council does have authority on how funds are spent. Finally, he commented that federal law would have to be notified to have the ultimate victory.

Council Member Fernandez commented that he understood the frustration regarding the issue and that a solution is being worked on. Additionally, he commented that it would be better to have flights take off from the East. He further commented that everyone needs to work together and push for equitable and speedy solution.

Mayor Dorn commented that he had met with Lydia Kennard, the new acting director of the airport to discuss expansion and noted that the City has taken a position and doesn=t want any more planes flying over this City. He further commented that avigation

agreements were discussed and it was asked that they be eliminated and a lawsuit may have to be filed. Additionally, he pointed out that the City was asking for 25 million dollars a year to insulate homes and that staff has been ordered to hire enough personnel so that a minimum of 100 homes per month could be insulated. Additionally, he commented that 2 million dollars has been requested so that experts can be hired to evaluate the pollution the airplanes are causing and that each dime will go towards insulation of homes if passed. Finally, he commented that a meeting is planned with the FAA staff and the City Administrator to attempt to resolve the issues that have been discussed and an elimination of avigation easements is being requested.

No other persons wishing to address the Council on this matter, Mayor Dorn declared the public hearing closed at the hour of 8:32 p.m.



Additionally, he reported that the airport is looking to divert their small planes to other areas and encouraged everyone to work together.

Council Member Fernandez:

Commented that there is an issue regarding a breakdown in communications on procedure for a Saturday pickup with trash and requested that the process be explained in the next edition of the Inglewood News in English and Spanish.

Council Member Kirkley:

Commented that the parks and engineering personnel have come up with a good plan for the park and noted that it will be presented to the Council next week. He also noted that they will be moving forth with renovation and opening.

Mayor Dorn:

Commented that the City has requested permission from the federal government to use CDBG funds and FAA funds for other than low income and noted that the City was denied

use of set-aside funds. Additionally, he commented that the City has requested its lobbyist to assist through legislation in using CDBG funds and set aside funds for other than low income.

Thanked the block clubs who held their meetings this past Saturday noting that he was pleased to have attended two of the meetings. He commented that he had gotten the impression that many of the residents are not informed as to what Council is doing regarding issues and do not know that Council has ordered staff to hire more personnel so that a minimum of 100 homes a month can be insulated.
